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Korean Adverbs

Learning the **Korean Adverbs** is very important because its structure is used in every day conversation. The more you master it the more you get closer to mastering the Korean language. But first we need to know what the role of Adverbs is in the structure of the grammar in Korean.

Korean adverbs are part of speech. Generally they're words that modify any part of language other than a noun. Adverbs can modify verbs, adjectives (including numbers), clauses, sentences and other adverbs. Here are some examples:

| English Adverbs | Korean Adverbs |
|-------------------------|---|
| adverbs | 부사 - bu sa |
| I read a book sometimes | 저는 가끔 독서를 합니다. - jeo neun ga kkeum dok seo reur hap ni da |
| I will never smoke | 담배를 절대로 피우지 않겠습니다 - dam bae reur jeol dae ro pi u ji anh get seup ni da |
| are you alone? | 혼자이신가요? - hon ja i sin ga yo ? |

As you can see from the example above, the structure of the Adverbs in Korean has a logical pattern. Locate the Adverbs above and see how it works with the rest of the sentence in Korean.
