<b>Hello</b>	안 녁 하 세 요 <i>ahn nyeong ha say yo</i>	Never just say "Ahn nyeong". That's only for friends or when speaking to children. Otherwise it sounds rude.
<b>My name is _____</b>	_____ 입 니 다 <i>im nee da</i>	
<b>Nice to meet you</b>	반 갑 습 니 다 <i>ban kam sub nee da</i>	
<b>Thank you</b>	감 사 합 니 다 <i>kam sa hab nee da</i>	There are several ways to say thank you. This is just one way. It is very polite.
<b>I'm sorry</b>	죄 송 합 니 다 <i>chuay song hab nee da</i>	There are several ways to say sorry. This is just one way. It is very polite.
<b>Where is _____?</b>	_____ 어 디 있 어 요? <i>oe dee iss soy yo?</i>	This question can be used for anything (places, people, things, etc.). Just put the noun at the beginning.
<b>Where is the bathroom?</b>	화 장 실 어 디 있 어 요? <i>hwa jang shil oe dee iss soy yo?</i>	<i>hwa jang shil</i> = bathroom 화 장 실
<b>Teacher</b>	선 생 님 <i>sun sang nim</i>	If you want to use a teacher's name, say their last name and put "teacher" afterward.
<b>Principal</b>	교 장 선 생 님 <i>kyo jang sun sang nim</i>	Mrs. Park = Park <i>sun sang nim</i> Mr. Kim = Kim <i>sun sang nim</i>
<b>Vice principal</b>	교 감 선 생 님 <i>kyo kam sun sang nim</i>	
<b>Classroom</b>	교 실 <i>kyo sil</i>	
<b>Teacher's Office</b>	교 사 사 무 실 <i>kyo sah sah moo shil</i>	
<b>Elementary School</b>	초 등 학 교 <i>cho dung hak kyo</i>	
<b>My home</b>	우 리 집 <i>oo ree jib</i>	<i>Jib</i> (집) means "home." Koreans always say "our" (우리) instead of "my". So you always say "our home," (우리집).
